## Why Comment?

Correct factual errors

Attempt to influence the proposed regulation

Preserve ability to challenge the rule

Express policy view



#### What to Comment On?

All Regulatory Proposals

Proposals that generally impact business

Proposals that directly impact business

Proposals with significant impact on business or specific facilities

Proposals with catastrophic impact

- > External support





# EO 12866 Meetings

Request for important rulemakings

Focus on economic impact (costs and benefits) of rule

Time to influence OMB

Trade associations great for this purpose



#### **Who Should Comment?**

#### Trade Association

Share costs

Do not have to draw attention to company (at comment stage)

## **Individual Company**

Can be focused on specific company interests

Do not have to meet lowest common denominator



### The Importance of the Comment Letter

## Creates the administrative record

If it *isn't* in someone's comment letter, there is no basis to challenge later

Does not have to be your own letter, but don't assume someone else will make the argument you want If it *is* in the record and the agency failed to consider it, you've got the start of a challenge



#### What Should Be in a Comment Letter?

Factual errors or omissions

Procedural or process failures

Legal errors

Unsupported conclusions

Any information the agency should consider that is not in the record



## **Getting content for comment letter**

Review the proposed rule

Review key documents in the docket


Review key statutes

#### Work with your team

- Technical experts (internal and external)
- Business client
- Legal (internal and external)
- Government affairs
- Communications

## **Challenging a Rule**

#### Prepare Early!

- Waiting until final rule is published will likely put you at a disadvantage depending on the rule, the court, and size of the docket
- Know what court, the relevant legal standards, and deadline to file a challenge
- Track the final rule at OMB

If the rule is critical and will need to be challenged no matter what the final rule looks like, hire counsel early

- Ideally they help prepare comment letter to ensure proper record is created
- Have counsel review the administrative record, including other key comment letters, <u>before</u> the final rule is out



## **Considerations in Bringing a Challenge**

Who will bring it?
(Trade association or company?)

Do you (or the trade) have **standing**?

Policy and PR considerations

Strength of arguments

Implications for the business

Implications for other litigation



## **Considerations in Bringing a Challenge**

APA standard generally: "arbitrary, capricious, an abuse of discretion, or otherwise not in accordance with law."

- •Some federal statutes will have additional/different standards
- •State APA can differ from federal (also check state substantive statute)

Validity or as applied

•As applied has different analysis, deadlines, and standards

Procedural

- Process issue
- Failure to consider an issue/respond to comment

Substantive

- Factual errors
- Technical flaw
- Inconsistent with law



## **Assessing Likelihood of Success**



Rulemaking challenges are not impossible to win!



#### What does success look like?

- Is it a stay during litigation? Very difficult to get.
- Remand? Rule invalidated? More likely.



Procedural or substantive challenge?
